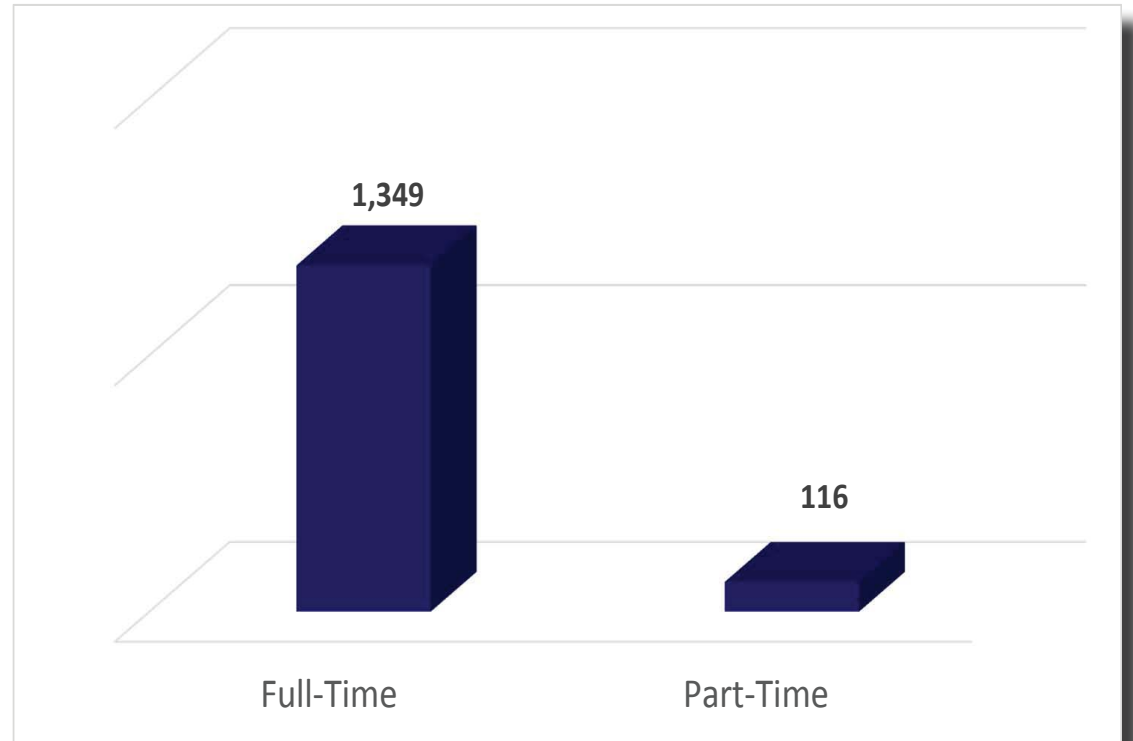

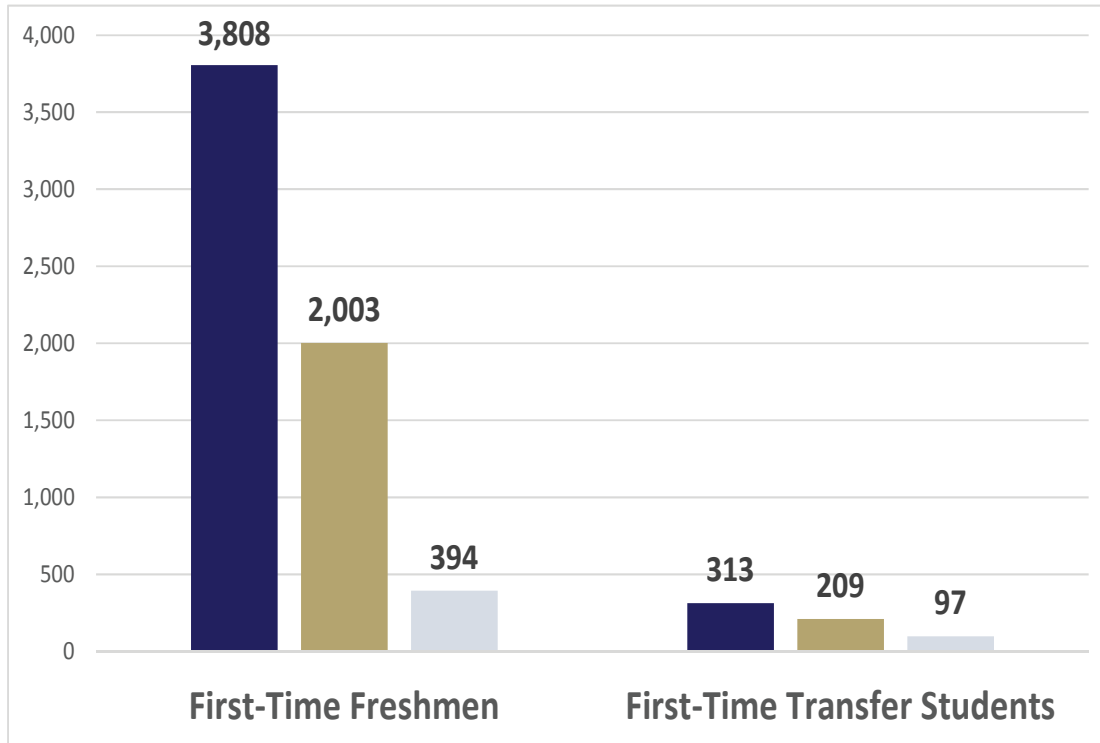

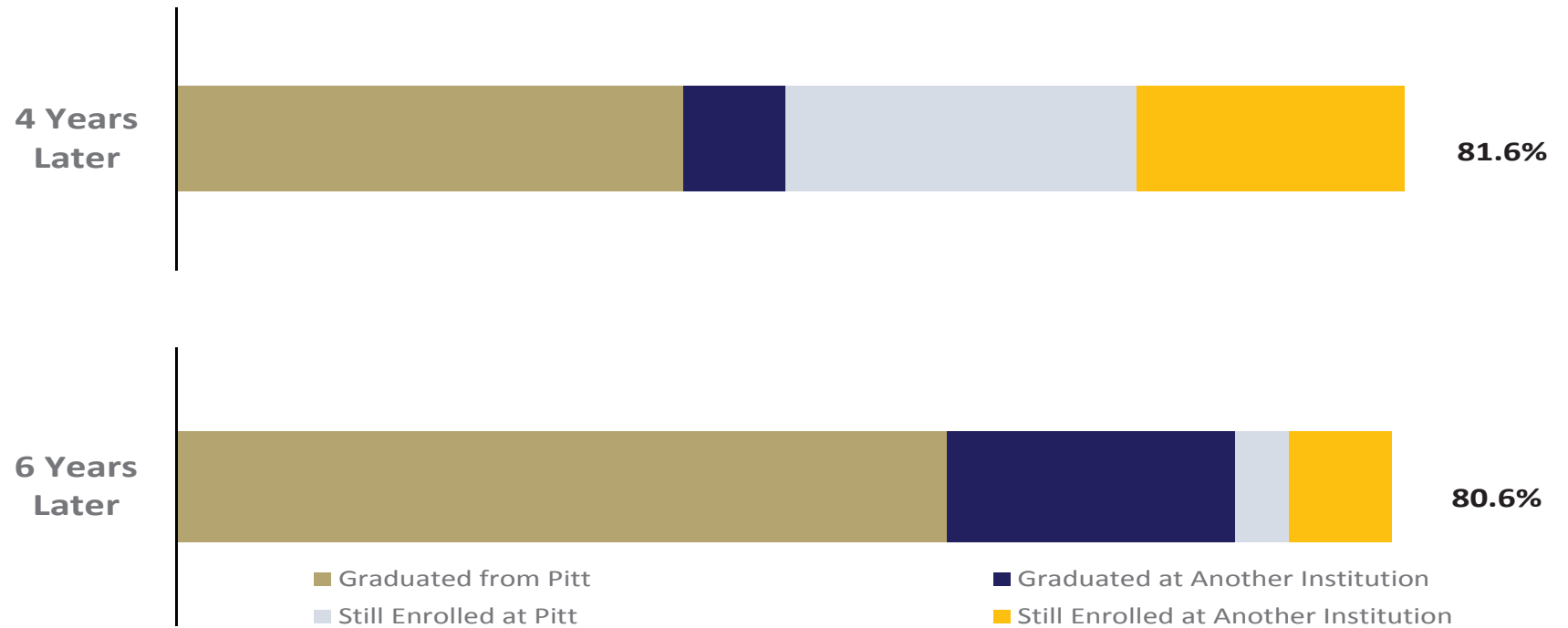
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Undergraduate Success & Progress

First-time full-time freshmen in Fall 2015 that returned for their second year (in Fall 2016): 66%



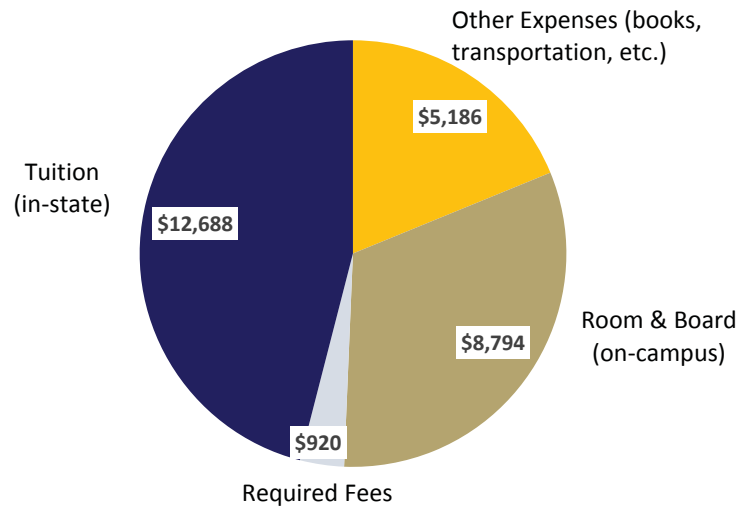

Financial Aid Awarded

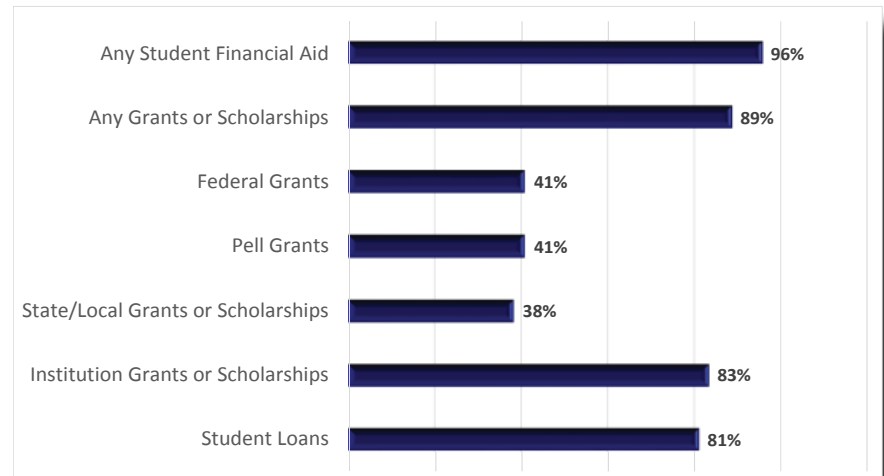
Annual Need-Based Scholarships & Grants

78% of 2015-16 full time undergraduates received need-based grants or scholarships; the average award for the year was \$9,767.

Annual Need-Based Work Study and Loans

74% of 2015-16 full-time undergraduates received need-based work-study and/or loans (not including parent loans); the average loan for the year was \$4,660.
