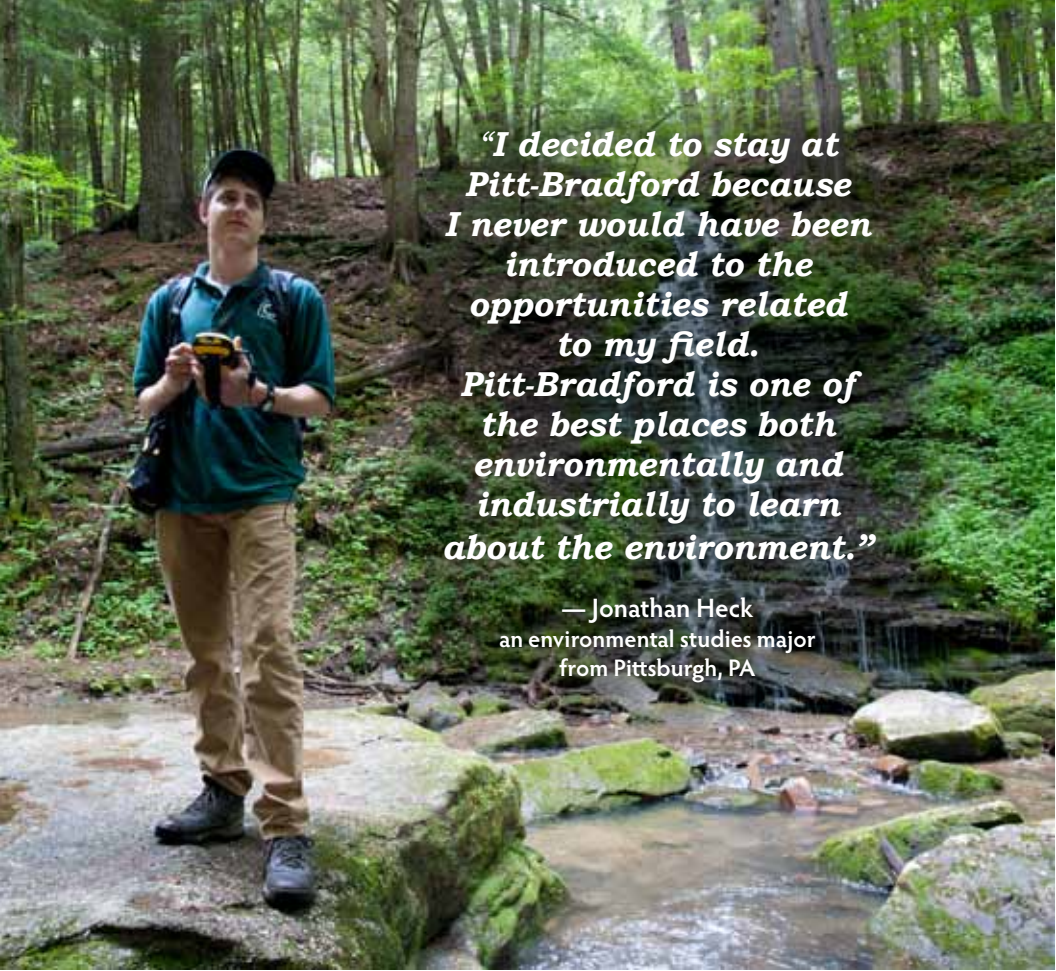


Conduct research

With your degree from the University of Pittsburgh, you'll be on your way to getting a great job or into graduate school, just like our other alumni.

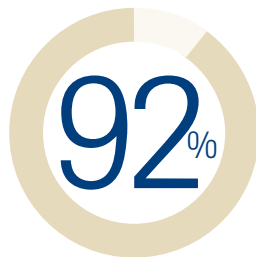
Ninety-two percent have found a job in their career field or have entered graduate or professional school within six months of graduation.

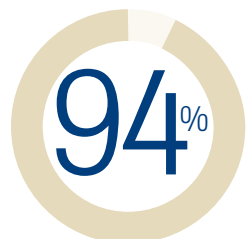
